BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Supported Instruction uses READ 180 Next Generation/System44 which is an intensive reading intervention program for students who are reading below grade level. The program is designed to meet the needs of struggling readers through teacher-directed lessons, adaptive software, age-appropriate, high-interest nonfiction and fiction texts, and data-driven differentiation. READ 180/System 44 engages students in learning and motivates them to take ownership and accountability for their learning and achieve reading progress and success.

ADMINISTRATIVE CONSIDERATION:

The purpose of the course is remediation and support for students who fall into the Intensive and Strategic levels on the Reading Inventory in grades 9-12. The course will be taught by a Special Education teacher who has received training in Read 180/Next Generation System44.

Course Description:

Supported Instruction uses READ 180 Next Generation/System44 which is an intensive reading intervention program for students who are reading below grade level. The program is designed to meet the needs of struggling readers through teacher-directed lessons, adaptive software, age-appropriate, high-interest nonfiction and fiction texts, and data-driven differentiation. READ 180 engages students in learning and motivates them to take ownership and accountability for their learning and achieve reading progress and success.

Class Set Up:

Students will divide into three, small, teacher-assigned groups and rotate through three stations for 15 minutes each.

- Small group- Students receive individualized, teacher-led instruction to help them master reading skills and strategies.
- Independent Reading- Students select novels on their reading level and read them at their own pace in a
 comfortable, quiet environment. Students will record their progress and will take Reading Counts tests as they
 complete each novel. Our goal is to read 5-10 independent novels throughout the course.
- Instructional Technology- Students will receive intensive, individualized instruction in reading, vocabulary, spelling, and writing. Students will work through an adaptive computer-guided program which tracks goals and progress.

Grading Procedures:

Grades are based on the Read180/System44 model. The grade is divided into five parts, each contributing 20% to the overall grade.

- Small Group Work (20% of grade)
- Scholastic Readl80/System44 Software (20% of grade)
- Independent/Modeled Reading (20% of grade)
- Productive Participation (20% of grade)
- Final Exam (20% of grade)

NOTICE

The activity/course codes specified in this document are detailed in the <u>South Carolina</u> <u>Department of Education Activity Coding System for Student Information Systems (SIS) 2016-2017</u>, which is issued by the Office of Federal and State Accountability. Please note that any changes in course titles or codes, including the deactivation or creation of course titles and codes, are indicated in aqua type in the coding manual.

The following three South Carolina Department of Education (SCDE) documents that contain course titles and codes will be updated and reissued each year: Activity Coding System for SIS, CATE Student Reporting Procedures, and Required Credentials for Professional Staff Members in the Instructional Programs of South Carolina's Public Schools.

Modifications to the acceptable areas of certification and to the mandatory attendant training requirements that appear in this document are reviewed and approved by the SCDE with input from the field each year.

Introduction

The purpose of Required Credentials for Professional Staff Members in the Instructional Programs of South Carolina's Public Schools is to provide districts a listing of the acceptable credentials for educators working in various settings and roles.

Regardless of whether a specific position is listed in this document, all professional instructional staff must hold valid South Carolina educator certificates.

Organization

Required Credentials is organized by the settings and roles in which an educator may be employed. The document begins with district office leadership and administrative positions followed by school-based leadership and administrative positions. Sections detailing the required credentials for teachers are arranged either by subject area or grade level.

Text Indicated in Red

Text marked in red font reflects course additions, deletions, or changes for 2016-17 based on the Activity Coding System. Any changes in required credentials for a course are also indicated in red and have been included to provide clarification or to give districts greater flexibility.

Certification Code

If the acceptable credential for a role or course is a certification area only, the certification field and code are listed.

Certification Code plus mandatory attendant training (Certification Code +)

If the acceptable credential for a role or course is a certification field plus mandatory attendant training, the certification field and code are listed followed by a + sign. The additional requirement(s) will be specified.

No Specific Certification or No Code (NC)

If the acceptable credential for a role or course is not a specific certification area, the code NC is indicated, meaning that the assigned individual may be certified in any area.

No Specific Certification or No Code plus mandatory attendant training (NC+)

If the acceptable credential for a role or course is not a specific certification area but does require mandatory attendant training, NC+ will be listed. The additional requirement(s) will be specified.

Certification Codes no longer issued (*)

Certification areas that are no longer issued are marked by an asterisk (*). Educators with these fields on a valid certificate may continue to be assigned to the roles and courses listed in the document.

Effective 2016-17 School Year

Credit-bearing Courses

All credit-bearing courses are listed in the Grades 9-12 section of this document. Credit-bearing courses carry the same activity codes if taught in Grades 7 and 8.

Unlisted Credit-bearing Courses

A credit-bearing course that is not listed in the Grades 9-12 section of this document is either a locally designed elective course approved by the local board of trustees or a locally designed subject-area course approved by the SCDE. The required credentials for teachers of locally designed elective courses are determined by the local board of trustees.

Advanced Fine Arts

On an educator's certificate, the certification field Advanced Fine Arts does not specify the content area in which the educator has professional experience. Within the course listings, the specific content area for Advanced Fine Arts is indicated in parentheses. For example, in order to teach a course in band, the educator with Advanced Fine Arts certification must have a concentration in music, indicated as Advanced Fine Arts (Music).

Proviso 1.76 Middle School Staffing

<u>Proviso 1.76</u> allows educators certified in a high school content area to teach the same content area in seventh or eighth grade.

Proviso 1.90 Highly Qualified Teacher

Proviso 1.90 Teacher certification requirements for highly qualified educators aligned to No Child Left Behind are suspended. The department shall report to the General Assembly by February 1, 2017, on the updated Federal requirements under the Every Student Succeeds Act.

Charter Schools

The certification requirements included in this document apply to teachers and administrators employed in public charter schools except as provided for in <u>charter school</u> statute and regulations.
